We will look at the quintessential example of the still story in the short film, La Jetee, classic and contemporary montage. 1st project will be based on images and music for emotion. -The only story in TV and Film is the one we see (and hear). For our purposes, the visual story is a collection of shots that are put into order in a specific sequence. While the composition and content of the shots matter, the sequence also reveals a story through juxtaposition.

-Watch short film, La Jetee (The Pier), a film shot in stills.

This is a sort of template for your first project (26 minutes).

-Refresh on "The Visual Story." Watch a scene from 12 Monkeys.

-Discuss Montage and show examples from films, The Battleship Potemkin and The Good The Bad and The Ugly. (Give out notes [below], which will be needed for following week's

test). Be sure to include all notes for this Unit.

[Eisenstein's montage theories are based on the idea that montage originates in the "collision" between different shots in an illustration of the idea of thesis and antithesis. There are 5, but you only need to know 2:

Intellectual - uses shots which, combined, elicit an intellectual meaning. [2]

• Intellectual montage examples from Eisenstein's October and Strike. In Strike, a shot of striking workers being attacked cut with a shot of a bull being slaughtered creates a film metaphor suggesting that the workers are being treated like cattle. This meaning does not exist in the individual shots; it only arises when they are juxtaposed. (The Kuleshov Effect) (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=\_gGl3LJ7vHc) (Hitchcock) (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=hCAE0t6KwJY)

Rhythmic - includes cutting based on continuity, creating visual continuity from edit to edit.

- Rhythmic montage example from *The Good The Bad and the Ugly* where the protagonist and the two antagonists face off in a three-way duel
- Another rhythmic montage example from *The Battleship Potemkin*'s "Odessa steps" sequence.

Now, we more likely use Montage in films in order to show the passage of time. (see Team America, Montage <a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=pFrMLRQIT">https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=pFrMLRQIT</a> k)
